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ON SAFARI AT CHOBE CHILWERO: A FEAST OF **ELEPHANTS, IN NORTHERN BOTSWANA**

KASANE, Botswana -- Chobe Chilwero safari camp, in northeast Botswana, does everything right. Part of Abercrombie & Kent's luxury safari portfolio, Chilwero is small and intimate, hosting no more than 30 guests at a time. The lodge and thatched bungalows are modest outside but sleek and elegant inside. An expert staff, from the guides to the waiters, is proud to work there. Delicious meals, served on a covered veranda, are exceptional.

A winner, indeed. But for first-time guests, a puzzle awaits. Chobe Chilwero, perched on a gently sloping hill next to Chobe National Park, is just 10 minutes by car from the airport at Kasane, and a quarter-mile off the paved highway between Kasane and the Zimbabwe border. Most of Chobe Chilwero's guests have spent the previous week flying into wilderness camps on puddle-jumpers that don't land until they've buzzed the field to scare off the warthogs. A wilderness camp near an airport? It doesn't compute.

But when you get your mind around the geography, it all comes right. The mighty Chobe River not only marks Chobe National Park's northern border, but the boundary between Botswana and Namibia. The river is a natural destination and a crossing, not just for game animals but also for local fishermen, tourist vans and commercial trucks, thus the highway.

Chobe Chilwero is in the wilderness, because the national park, 2.5 million acres of rocky hills, riverine marshes and shady woodlands, is next door. Road or no road, this is prime game-drive country, especially during the dry season. From May through November, as waterholes inland dry up, vast herds of antelope, African buffalo and an estimated 65,000 elephants trek to the river's sandy banks, followed by prides of lions and 4-by-4 expedition vehicles.

As we sat on the Lodge's open-air veranda, sipping tea and eating cookies, the views, both near and far, were breathtaking. Thoughts of the highway faded. In the distance, the river glistened, tour boats moved slowly along the shore and herds of waterbuck and buffalo grazed on the flood plains. In front of us, baboons and vervet monkeys scampered through the trees and warthogs combed the grass, looking for tidbits.

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
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Chobe Chilwero's twice-daily game drives are scheduled in daylight hours when most animals come down to the river. Chobe has so many elephants -- too many, say the experts -- that close-up sightings are virtually guaranteed. But we also saw antelopes, hyenas, baboons, birds and lions. The "water" trips, on small riverboats, steer into inlets and close to the shore to let passengers snap photos of crocodiles, water birds, buffalo and hippos. As at other A&K camps, our guides were knowledgeable and friendly, and the vehicle, limited to six guests, was comfortable and roomy. Most of the other tour vehicles we passed as we jolted over the uneven sand were nightmarishly full, with three tourists per seat and as many as 12 visitors to a van.

By late afternoon, we were back in the main Lodge, gathering for a sundowner. A rambling, one-story stucco structure, it had a thatched cathedral ceiling and a small library corner. In the living room, leather sofas and wing chairs flanked coffee tables and a large fireplace, while polished side tables and chairs provided retro-colonial comfort. Inset shelves and museum lighting displayed the Lodge's collection of rare art and collectibles (some for sale), including pottery, central and West African carvings, beaded Masai milk gourds, Zulu shields and spears, masks and intricately woven Zulu baskets.

Our thatched bungalow, one of 15 large cottages overlooking the river, was also dressed with African art. Painted in warm cream tones, it had a four-poster bed with mosquito netting, beautifully upholstered chairs, tables and benches and huge tiled bathroom with double sinks, a sunken tub, separate shower, a dressing table, large closets and drawers. Amenities included an electronic safe, hairdryer, bottled water and lotions. We had a private rear yard, and a patio and outdoor shower, with a rear gate that led to the swimming pool. We used just once, I'm sorry to say. With so much else to see, we never had time.
